

A few extra ideas.

Spring Watch

You could draw a plan of your garden or outside space.

- Plot in the plants that you can find
- Keep a log/tally of the birds and animals that visit
- Research the plants and animals - feeding habits, countries that they visit etc.
- Write a fact file about them.
- Take some video footage on a tablet or borrow a grown-ups phone (always ask first!)
- Be your own Chris Packham or Michaela Strachan and make a video report about all the things you have found out.

Science

- We will be looking at animals and animal groups once we are back at school. (mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish)
- Any art work linked to these activities would be great, drawing, painting models or sculptures.

History

You could also investigate old and new toys. They could phone/FaceTime/Skype family and friends to find out about the toys that they used to play with. Link it back to the materials that they were made out of etc.

A lot of the museums and zoos have live feeds and online resources that are free at the moment. There are also Youtube clips for inspiration as well.

The Literacy Shed has some great video clips - any of them might inspire the children to write a story or a letter.

Maths

- Learn to tell the time, o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to.
- Money - set up a shop with toys of items from the kitchen cupboards. The children could make price tickets and write shopping lists. They could find out totals and think about giving change. Start with totals to 10p, then 20p, 50p etc.

If you're feeling really brave you could make a band with pots and pans from the kitchen. Can you play alongside your favourite tune?
